

INTERVIEWING TIPS:

- Plan ahead of time. Schedule a time and a place that is convenient for you and your family to meet.
- 2. Make sure that you are in a quiet environment where you have privacy.
- 3. Write a list of questions: Prepare 5–10 openended questions that you would like to ask. Open-ended questions elicit more than a yes/no answer. (For example, Why is your American dream important to you?)
- 4. Listen carefully to the interviewee and keep notes of names, places, events, and dates.

- **5.** Don't worry about pauses; give the interviewee time to think and speak.
- 6. Review your notes with the interviewee to make sure that you accurately transcribed what was said. You may want to use an audio recorder or video camera to record the interview so you don't miss any details.
