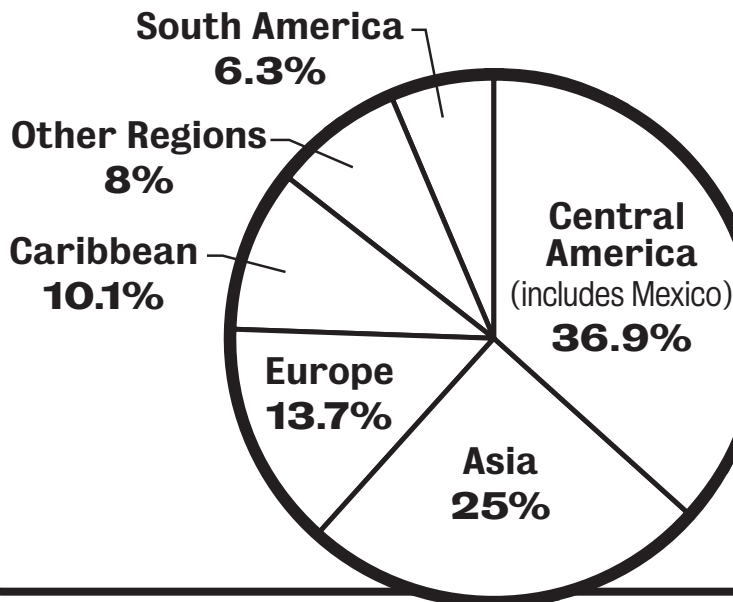

# Coming to the U.S.

In March 2003, the population in the United States included 33.5 million people who were born in foreign countries and were not U.S. citizens at birth.
