TEACHING TIP OF THE WEEK

Teaching Irony

The Giving Spirit is a play that presents an opportunity for students to begin to understand the concept of irony. Explain to students that an ironic situation is one in which the actual result is very different from, or opposite of, what is expected or intended.

Ask students what was unexpected about the ending of the play. Were they surprised? How does the author use this surprise ending to make a point? Conclude by having students think of other books or stories that they've read that had ironic endings. Or ask them to think of situations they've experienced themselves that were ironic.

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The President's Prize.....p.2

Standard

SOCIAL STUDIES: Students should understand the U.S.'s relationship to other nations and to world affairs, and how nations interact with one another.

Summary

On December 10, President Barack Obama will be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. He is the first U.S. President in 90 years to win that award while in office. The Nobel Peace Prize committee says it gave Obama the award because of his efforts to work with other nations to resolve world issues.

Pre-Reading Discussion

What do you think a Nobel Peace Prize is? Why do you think the award is given out?

Background

The Nobel prizes are named after Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel. He died in 1896. Nobel left behind money to be awarded to people in certain fields who had done their best to help humanity. Since 1901, Nobel Prizes have been awarded in the fields of physics, chemistry, medicine, peace, and literature. A sixth Nobel Prize for economics was added in 1968.

The first two people to win the Nobel Peace Prize were Jean Henry Dunant and Frédéric Passy, in 1901. Dunant, from Switzerland, was the founder of the International Committee of the Red Cross. Passy was from France. He was the founder and president of a French group that worked to promote peace.

Lesson Extension

Ask students to come up with their own Nobel awards in six categories. Have them think of friends, family members, or public figures to nominate under each category. Students should then write down why they nominated those people. Then have the class vote on who should get each award.

Post-Reading Discussion

What do you think are some of the accomplishments of people who won a Nobel Peace Prize? If you wanted to work to make the world a more peaceful place, what are some of the things you would do?
